Employee Spotlight

Laura Albert

Payroll Manager

Each month, Town Administrator Patrice Garvin highlights a single employee whose hard work and dedication exemplifies what it means to be an employee for the Town of Belmont. In the Employee Spotlight series, we are able to shine a light on incredible employee achievements and provide an opportunity to introduce and recognize Belmont Town employees throughout the Belmont community.

In this month's Bulletin, Town Administrator Garvin would like to recognize Laura Albert of the Town of Belmont's Accounting Department. Laura is a relatively new member of the accounting team and began her role as Payroll Manager in 2023. Though her tenure so far has been short her impact has been felt though her ability, professionalism, and her willingness to learn and collaborate with colleagues. Her contributions to conquering challenges and her ability to learn the ropes over the past year has allowed her to become an imperative member of the Accounting Team.

The Accounting Department works to maintain the fiscal records and internal financial controls for all Departments of the Town and School, as well as, processing the Town's payroll and accounts payable to the Town's vendors. When asked about the role that Laura plays in all this, she says with a characteristic smile and chuckle, "my main responsibility is processing the Town's payroll from start to finish."

Those who work with and know Laura are likely to recount her professionalism, willingness to learn, confidence take on challenges, an unrelenting drive to get to the root cause of an issue and her collaborative approach to getting things done. Handling a payroll that includes hundreds of employees along with other temporary and seasonal positions is no easy task and Laura prides herself mastering the details and intricacies of her work, which is where she finds her motivation.

As Laura explained, having so many details and intricacies can, on a regular, basis lead to searching for answers to complex questions, evaluating current systems and practices to discover ways they can be more efficient, as well as, learning nuances of our current payroll systems and tools to leverage that knowledge to increase and maintain accuracy. As Laura says, "I kind of feel like I'm Scooby-Doo—digging and digging until I solve the mystery and there is nothing better that pulling the mask off a problem that you're trying to solve."

Laura found her way into the municipal sector at a time when she was seeking better use of what she sees as her to greatest professional skills: customer service and a drive to help people. In Laura's words, "I wanted to work somewhere that I would be on the forefront of helping people." Laura has a deep appreciation for the impact that working for a municipality can have from witnessing the work of her mother who spent over 20



years in the in the municipal world and also her brother. Laura had even worked for a short time when she was 18 in the Belmont Treasurer's Office. All of this helped Laura know that the Town of Belmont would be a good fit.

Since starting in Belmont, Laura has seen challenges as exciting. As Laura says, "Any new job that you have is going to have its challenges and I think you have to expect that. As someone who recently completed their first year, my biggest challenge is understanding how everything works, because everywhere is different. I think of it like you're climbing a ladder, just taking it one rung at a time getting closer and closer to understanding. With each rung of the ladder, the more confident I get."

Part of achieving that confidence has been Laura's ability to prioritize communication and collaboration with her fellow employees, a quality that has led her to achieve much in a short time. Whether it is solving a payroll issue, cleaning up pay and deduction codes, W-2 reporting, working toward a full digitization of payroll or playing a hand in the roll out of the new Employee Self Service (ESS) portal, Laura credits collaboration as the main force that drives things forward. Like Scooby, Laura knows that the mystery can't be solved without the help of the rest of the "gang" and she is always ready to hop aboard or welcome aboard collaborators on the "Mystery Machine."

Laura still has much to aspire to in the coming years with Belmont. Looking forward she is still focused on the people that work for the Town and the people of the Belmont community. In Laura's words, "I work a lot with numbers when I'm doing payroll, however what I'm doing isn't all about the numbers—it is the people behind those numbers who've done the work and how that work has done so much good for other people. At the end of the day, we are all just people helping other people."

When Laura is not problem solving and enjoying her work, she enjoys kayaking, a special hobby that she took up during the Pandemic. She enjoys taking her kayak to many beautiful spots across the State and is looking forward with great anticipation to the upcoming "kayak season" this spring and summer.

Community Updates:

Belmont Police Department

The Belmont Police Department has kept busy over the past month responding to numerous calls for service logging 19 motor-vehicle crashes, 19 summonses/arrests, 65 Co-Responder Responses and 1,573 calls for service. Officer Bingo, Belmont PD's Australian Labradoodle "comfort dog" attended training at in Tewksbury and we are proud to report that he earned his AKC STAR Puppy and AKC CGC (Canine Good Citizen) acknowledgements. Officer Bingo also visited the Town Municipal Complex, stopping by the Town Treasurer's Office for a photo shoot.

The Belmont Police Department has also announced it has posted a job opportunity for a Police Officer position, more information can be found on the Belmont Police Website or by clicking here.

Also in April, the Belmont PD announced their participation in the <u>Blue Envelope Program</u>. This initiative represents a collaborative effort aimed at fostering a safer and more understanding environment for drivers with autism spectrum during traffic stops.

The Police Department was also excited to engage with members of the community and students at Burbank's STEM night. We hope that everyone enjoyed their fingerprint cards!

The Police Department would also like to acknowledge Belmont Police Communications Officer William Wood has been awarded a Life Saving Commendation by State 911, presented on April 18. Officer Wood's exceptional actions on March 13, 2024, were pivotal in saving the life of a 25-year-old male, earning him this commendation.

Upon receiving a call regarding an unconscious individual in cardiac arrest, Wood provided precise guidance on utilizing the Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and administering CPR. Thanks to his swift actions, the patient received vital assistance from the AED, leading to a successful revival. Subsequently, Fire personnel promptly arrived at the scene, administered additional aid and transferred the patient to a nearby hospital for further medical attention.



Belmont Fire Department

Members of the Belmont Fire Department have had an active month responding to incidents as well as conducting numerous training evolutions. Our recent training activities included practicing rapid deployment of our pumper's master stream appliance, capable of flowing a large volume of water on a large, or rapidly advancing fire. In addition, McLean Hospital partnered with our Training Division to provide a class for each shift on the operation and safety of their MRI machines. Our firefighters were able to gain the knowledge necessary to work safely, and mitigate emergencies involving these units.

Our firefighters also participated in community outreach at the Burbank School's STEM night. We showcased some of the technology used in the fire service to help save lives. This included demonstrations of our thermal imaging cameras as well as a cardiac monitor, self-contained breathing apparatus, and personal protective equipment.

The Belmont Fire Department also welcomed Stenio Pereira as a new firefighter to the Department. FFOP Pereira previously served in another career fire department in the Commonwealth and is currently assigned to Group 1 in the Operations Division.

With warm weather months approaching, we would like to remind all residents to use landscaping mulch safely, and not to dispose of smoking materials in mulch beds. Homeowners should consider providing a minimum of 18 inches of clearance between mulch beds and any combustible building material, including wood decks. Rocks or pea stone may be a safer alternative.

According to the Massachusetts Department of Fire Services, the most notable mulch fire in Massachusetts occurred in May 2015 in Arlington. A man was killed, and over \$6 million dollars in property damage occurred when smoking materials were discarded in the mulch bed of an apartment complex and the fire rapidly spread to the building.

- If you smoke, put it out, all the way, every time! Use appropriate receptacles for disposal. Never discard smoking materials in a mulch bed.
- Never discard smoking materials out a car window.
- Mulch that is piled too deeply (more than a few inches) can build up heat and spontaneously catch fire.
- Report any smoke or fire by calling 9-1-1.



Belmont Light Department

Things are looking Bright at Belmont Light!

Belmont Light has once again received national recognition for achieving exceptional electric reliability in 2023. The recognition comes from the American Public Power Association (APPA), a trade group that represents more than 2,000 not-for-profit, community-owned electric utilities.

APPA tracks power outage and restoration data for electric utilities through its subscription-based eReliability Tracker service. Once per year, APPA's Reliability Team compares this data to national statistics tracked by the U.S. Energy Information Administration (EIA) for all types of electric utilities.

"It's encouraging to see year after year that public power's track record for providing highly reliable service is backed up by data," said APPA Director of Research and Development Paul Zummo. "These utilities are the best of the best when it comes to keeping the lights on. And these communities should be proud of their local power providers and appreciate the hard work that goes into earning this recognition."

Nationwide, the average public power customer experiences power interruption for less than half the amount of time that customers of other types of utilities do, including investor-owned utilities like Eversource and National Grid in this area.


"We are proud to receive this recognition. It is a testament to the hard work of all our staff to ensure that we keep Belmont powered," said Craig Spinale, General Manager of Belmont Light. "Our main goal is always to keep the lights on, and being recognized as a leader in that regard is special to all of us at Belmont Light."

In the year 2023, the average Belmont Light customer was without power for 36.6 minutes total, compared to 89 minutes for customers nationwide. The average Belmont Light customer experienced 0.4 outages in 2023, compared to 0.74 for customers nationwide. When a power outage did occur in Belmont, the duration was 90.7 minutes on average, compared to 111.6 minutes for all utilities.


Spinale credits Belmont Light's commitment to improving its electric delivery system through the Voltage Conversion Project, the ongoing effort stemming from the construction of the 60-megawatt Blair Pond Substation to replace outdated electric infrastructure with state-of-the-art 13.8 kV rated wires, transformers, poles, and other equipment.
