

Each month, Town Administrator Patrice Garvin shines a light on a single employee whose hard-work and dedication exemplifies what it means to be an employee for the Town of Belmont. In the *Employee Spotlight series*, we are able to shine a light on incredible employee achievements and provide an opportunity to introduce and recognize Belmont Town employees throughout the Belmont community.

In this month's Bulletin, Town Administrator Garvin would like to recognize Belmont's Department of Public Works Business Manager **Judi Carmody** who has worked for Belmont since 1999 and is now in her 24th year. Judi describes her job as "running the day-to-day operations of an office, while being a problem solver whose goal is to always, at the end of the day, help people."

Judi came to Belmont after spending 20 years in the restaurant industry, an experience she credits as the foundation of one of the most essential skills at her current role, "customer service." After her brother, who worked for the Belmont Facilities Department, mentioned Belmont as a nice place to work, Judi applied and landed in the Town's Accounting Department where she was responsible for processing the Town's bills. Judi's good work did not go unnoticed in the Accounting Department and it soon became apparent that she would be a fitting candidate for an open Administrative Assistant position in the Highway Department.

When it was decided that the Town's Highway, Parks, Cemetery, Water/Sewer, Recreation, and Trash/Recycling departments would transition to divisions within a new Department of Public Works, Judi was in on the ground floor. Judi worked closely, with her then Director, Peter Castanino who she called a "great person to help lead the effort and a great person generally who you could always go to for advice." Judi also recalled the steady hand and leadership of Michael Santoro who contributed greatly to the reorganization. Judi cites her role in the formation of the DPW as her greatest accomplishment, "it's not every day or every year that a Town reorganizes the structure of how it's departments operate and to get to be a part of that for the DPW was special. There was a lot of work, a lot of communication, and a little bit of anxiety that came with a big change like that, but it was exciting and we got it done."

Over the years, Judi also recalls her work with FEMA and MEMA which are the Federal and State emergency response organizations.



Whether it be flooding or a snowstorm that dropped 3-feet of snow, abnormal events like these can qualify for FEMA or MEMA reimbursements. Judi has become the senior staff person in the DPW that manages the processing of these major reimbursement requests. The ins-and-outs of the process are complex and take persistence to see through to the end. At times, fulfilling all the requirements can take up to a year to process. Judi's work over the years has led to her processing many of these requests successfully on behalf of the Town of Belmont.

A big part of Judi's day is interacting with Belmont residents who may come to the DPW with an issue or question. The biggest challenge Judi says she faces is having to tell a resident "No." Judi explains, "it's not easy sometimes, because your goal is to help everyone that comes into or calls the office, but sometimes that help isn't always saying yes. It might be that we take a step back and take the time to walk people through the rules and regulations that sometimes limit what we can do in a certain situation."

Judi finds motivation each day in a good cup of coffee, but more than that it is her ability to organize and prioritize. Each day she starts with ideas of what she needs to accomplish, but remains flexible to be able to deal with whatever might come her way. As a problem solver Judi says she takes a situation and "break(s) it down into pieces to understand it first" before stitching it back together anew as a solution. A fitting outlook, as Judi is also a talented seamstress. Judi also enjoys spending time bowling, in her garden, cooking, and "purging" (aka cleaning).

Looking toward the future, Judi is planning on retirement after what has been an impactful career in public service for the Town of Belmont. She's hoping that retirement can give her a chance to "enjoy a little more of life." Judi is as confident as ever in the DPW moving forward to provide the best services possible and will continue her mantra of "we're here to help and we want to help."

Community Updates:

Belmont Fire Department

The Fire Department responded to approximately 295 incidents during the month of September. These included fires, emergency medical responses, a hazardous materials incident, and many other types of emergencies.

In addition, firefighters we on hand at the Butler and Winn Brook Elementary Schools to help welcome students to school during their first week of classes. High fives, fist bumps, and words of encouragement were the order of the day as students made their way into the school building.

The Belmont Fire Department continued its support of Town Day by providing the EMS Bike Unit during the event and hosting an opportunity for youngsters and adults to view some of our equipment and learn about fire safety at Station 2 in Belmont Center. The event was very well attended and all had a great time!

At the end of August, FF Michael Nolan completed his probationary period and traded his orange probationary helmet shield for the black shield of a Belmont Firefighter during a gathering of his entire shift in early September.

The robust training at BFD continued in September as members at headquarters took their own initiative to practice using equipment to rescue firefighters and civilians from incidents where they may be unable to move on their own.

Belmont Public Library

As the leaves begin to turn color, the page leaves of the story of the Belmont Public Library continue to turn as well. We are approaching the end of the storied tenure of the library's current building as this season marks the last in the library's current home. The month of November will focus on packing up the library, and setting up temporary service locations.



Wednesday November 22nd will be our final day of service in this building with plans to reopen in our temporary locations in mid-December. We will however have some services available during this transition time including:

- 1) Online Reference Chat
- 2) Museum Pass Pickup
- 3) Access to daily newspapers and
- 4) Online Digital Library Services including database access, E-material access, and online library account creation.

In addition, we will be launching a Library Update Hotline and Email Service. This will be a clearinghouse for information where citizens can ask questions and give us their feedback and input on the temporary services.

Our temporary space plans continue to take final shape. Thank you to all of our partners in town, the COA board, the School Department and the Benton Board for their incredible collaboration.

The Beech Street Center will be our main location for public services. We will offer circulation of materials, reference services, computers, and programming for all ages. We will have some limited children's materials here as well. Library service hours at the Beech Street will be:
