AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT OF 2021

- American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021 was signed into law March 11, 2021
- Includes \$362 B in support for State, Local, Tribal, and Territorial fiscal recovery funds
- Recovery funding for municipalities with populations of less than 50K (i.e. Belmont) are funded by the US
 Treasury but administered through the states.
- Belmont funding eligibility period March 2021 to December 2024
 - \$7.8 M Coronavirus Local Stability Fund (in two allocations Direct Municipal and County)
 - \$1.0 M Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund III (ESSER III)
- US Treasury and the states Division of Local Services continues to issue guidance on grant funds.
- Funds do not need to be appropriated at Town Meeting.
- Funds cannot be used to restore stabilization funds, pension funds, debt service, borrowing costs, or as a match for federal grants.

ELIGIBLE USES OF ARPA FUNDS

Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund III (\$1.0 M estimated cap):

- 1. 80% for general school support
- 2. 20% for learning loss (summer school, extended day, calendar)

Four Categories of Eligible Uses (\$7.8 M estimated cap):

- 1. Address the public health expenditures and/or negative economic impacts, by funding COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff; including economic harms to workers, households, small businesses, impacted industries, and the public sector;
- 2. **Replace lost public sector revenue**, using this funding to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic;
- 3. **Provide premium pay for essential workers**, offering additional support to those who have borne and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical infrastructure sectors; and,
- 4. Invest in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure, making necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water, support vital wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and to expand access to broadband internet.

ARPA DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDING

ARPA Town funds are divided into two allocations:

Direct Municipal Allocation \$2.8M

County Allocation \$5.0M

Totaling \$7.8M

- On 06/02/21the Town directly applied to the state in order to receive the Direct Municipal portion.
- ☐ Massachusetts has a unique county structure, and the county portion was applied to by Middlesex County, therefore has a different receivable date.
- 1. \$1.3 Million Direct Municipal, July 1st Town received its first partial payment of our Direct Municipal Allocation. The second Direct Municipal Allocation (\$1.3M) is anticipated on July of 2022.
- 2. **\$2.5 Million County,** on August 16th the Town received \$2.5M its first partial payment of our County Allocation. The second County Allocation (\$2.5M) is anticipated on August of 2022.

TOWN'S PROCESS TO IDENTIFY USE OF FUNDS

Federal funding is **one-time** in nature and should not be used to fund recurring expenses

FY21

- Identified COVID-related expenses (Town and Schools) since March 3, 2021 and utilize federal funds to provide reimbursement for expenses.
- ESSER Funding covered FY21 COVID related expenses in Schools.
- CARES Funding covered FY21 COVID related expenses for the Town and Schools.

FY21 Certified FREE CASH

- The Town & Schools was able to capitalize on Federal Funds in FY21 to free up dollars that will flow to Free Cash.
- The balance sheet was submitted last week and the Town will be working with the Department of Revenue (DOR) to certify Free Cash, sometime in late September to early October.

TOWN'S PROCESS TO IDENTIFY USE OF FUNDS

FY22

- Identify COVID-related expenses in FY22 Operating Budget and utilize federal funds to cover expenditures.
- Identify one-time, unfunded COVID-related needs outside of the FY22 Operating Budget (e.g. vaccination clinics, tents, extra social worker support for transition, etc.) and utilize federal funds to cover expenditures.

FY23

- Identify one-time COVID-related expenses (if any) for FY23 Operating Budget and utilize federal funds.
- Model the use of ARPA and FY21 Free Cash, given the structural deficit in FY23.

GOALS FOR FEDERAL FUNDING


- I. To utilize ESSER II & ESSER III funds, in partnership with Town federal funding, to support a 2-year plan that addresses the prioritized needs of the BPS.
- 2. To establish a list of potential needs, pending the pandemic impact to the district (COVID Parking Lot), that may need a federal funding source from the Town.


ESSER UPDATE

- What is the amount of federal funding?
 - ESSER II \$456,001
 - ESSER III \$1,002,359
- ESSER II submission deadline: 7/30/21
 - Submitted on 6/25/21 *
- ESSER II funds must be expended by 9/30/23
- ESSER III submission deadline: 10/4/21
 - Submitted on 7/16/21 *
- ESSER III funds must be expended by 9/30/24

- The expenditures were put into two areas of need:
 - What we need next year to support students academically and from a mental health perspective
 - What we MAY need next year to respond to any future COVID need
